SUMMARY

**Chattahoochee Valley Community College
October 1, 2009 through September 30, 2010**

Chattahoochee Valley Community College (the “College”) provides general education at the freshman and sophomore levels leading to the Associate in Arts and Associate in Science degrees, that is designated to facilitate transfer to a senior college or university. Chattahoochee Valley Community College also provides the following vocational and career education programs that prepare students for employment in an occupational field and leads to certificates and/or Associate in Applied Science degrees: Accounting; Banking and Finance; Management and Supervision and Small Business Management Options; Business and Office Technology - Administrative Technology, Legal Administrative Technology and Medical Administrative Technology Options; Computer Information Systems - CISCO Networking and Information Technology Development Options; Fire Science; Homeland Security; Emergency Medical Services; Medical Assisting - Medical Office Transcription and Phlebotomy; Nursing; Practical Nursing; Nursing Assistant; Visual Communications - Multimedia and Print Media Options; Child Care and Development - Administrator, Paraprofessional/Teacher Aide and Advanced Paraprofessional/Teacher Aide; and Criminal Justice.

Chattahoochee Valley Community College is a publicly supported institution in the Alabama Community College System. The College is under the direction and control of the Alabama State Board of Education through the Department of Postsecondary Education.

This report presents the results of an audit, the objectives of which were to determine whether the financial statements present fairly the financial position and results of financial operations and whether the College complied with applicable laws and regulations, including those applicable to its major federal financial assistance programs. The audit was conducted in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, as well as, the requirements of the Department of Examiners of Public Accounts under the authority of the *Code of Alabama 1975*, Section 41-5-14.

An unqualified opinion was issued on the basic financial statements, which means the College's financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, its financial position and the results of its operations for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2010.

There were no findings in the prior audit.

Tests performed during the audit did not disclose any significant instances of noncompliance with applicable state laws and regulations; however, the College failed to comply with all the requirements of the tuition waiver program adopted by the Alabama State Board of Education. The tuition waiver program is designed for all full-time and Salary Schedule H-35 employees of the Alabama Community College System and the Alabama Department of Postsecondary Education and their dependents. Tuition waivers totaling \$108.00 were given to ineligible students. This amount was repaid prior to the completion of the audit.

The following officials/employees were invited to an exit conference to discuss the results of the audit: Dr. Linda Y. North, Interim President; Dr. David Hodge, Dean of Student and Administrative Services; Ms. Brenda Kelley, Business Manager; Dr. Freida Hill, Chancellor of the Department of Postsecondary Education; and Ms. Betty Peters, District II Board Member. The following individuals attended the exit conference: Dr. Linda Y. North, Interim President; Dr. David Hodge, Dean of Student and Administrative Services; Ms. Brenda Kelley, Business Manager; and Ms. Rosa Spencer of the Internal Audit Division of the Department of Postsecondary Education also attended via teleconference. Representing the Department of Examiners of Public Accounts was Annette G. Williams, Audit Manager.

In 1973, the Legislature appropriated \$500,000 to operate the College for a two-year period and \$900,000 for the actual construction of the College. In order to reflect and represent the entire valley area, the College was named Chattahoochee Valley State Community College. In 1980, the name was changed to Chattahoochee Valley Community College.

In January 1974, the College opened temporary administrative offices on the third floor of the Phenix City Utilities building, using the second floor of the building for classrooms. There were classrooms located over the whole area with classes being held in City Hall, the Westside Baptist Church, Central High School and the Phenix City Boys Club. A need for a permanent location became a necessity. In October 1974, Cason Callaway, Woodrow "Skeet" Wilson, John T. Wilson and Willie Wilson donated 103 acres located next to Highway 431 for the College to build a permanent home. The College moved to its present location in 1976.

Independent Auditor's Report

Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited the accompanying basic financial statements of Chattahoochee Valley Community College, as of and for the year ended September 30, 2010, as listed in the table of contents as Exhibits 1 through 3. These basic financial statements are the responsibility of Chattahoochee Valley Community College's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these basic financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the basic financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the basic financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall basic financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the basic financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Chattahoochee Valley Community College, as of September 30, 2010, and its changes in financial position, including cash flows, for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated June 1, 2011 on our consideration of Chattahoochee Valley Community College's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

The accompanying Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) is not a required part of the basic financial statements but is supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements of Chattahoochee Valley Community College, taken as a whole. The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (Exhibit 4) is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U. S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

FISCAL YEAR 2009-2010

Overview of the Financial Statements and Financial Analysis

Chattahoochee Valley Community College (CVCC) is a public, open door, comprehensive community college dedicated to meeting the changing needs of citizens in the East Alabama service area. By offering a broad spectrum of programs, the College provides students with opportunities for educational, personal and professional advancement. A wide range of academic courses prepares students to transfer to four-year institutions. Technical and workforce development programs equip students to master and practice certain skills as they enter the job market. The College offers a quality education, outstanding faculty, and an affordable way for its citizens to pursue college studies in their own home town.

CVCC presents its financial statements for fiscal year 2009-2010. The emphasis of discussions about these statements will be on current year data. There are three financial statements presented: A) the Statement of Net Assets; B) the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets; and, 3) the Statement of Cash Flows. This report of the College's financial statements provides an overview of its financial activities for the year and comparative amounts for the prior year.

A) Statement of Net Assets

The Statement of Net Assets presents the assets, liabilities, and net assets of the College as of the end of the fiscal year. The Statement of Net Assets is a point in time financial statement. The purpose of the Statement of Net Assets is to present to the readers of the financial statements a fiscal snapshot of CVCC. The Statement of Net Assets presents end-of-year data concerning Assets (current and non-current), Liabilities (current and non-current), and Net Assets (assets minus liabilities). The difference between current and non-current assets will be discussed in the financial statement disclosures.

From the data presented, readers of the Statement of Net Assets are able to determine the assets available to continue the operations of the institution. They are also able to determine how much the institution owes vendors, investors and lending institutions. Finally, the Statement of Net Assets provides a picture of the Net Assets (assets minus liabilities) and their availability for expenditure by the institution.

Net assets are divided into three major categories. The first category, invested in capital assets, net of debt, provides the institution's equity in property, plant, and equipment owned by the institution. The next asset category is restricted net assets, which is divided into two categories, expendable and nonexpendable. Expendable restricted net assets are available for expenditure by the institution but must be spent for purposes as determined by donors and/or external entities that have placed time or purpose restrictions on the use of the assets. The corpus of nonexpendable restricted resources is only available for investment purposes. The final category is unrestricted net assets which are available to the institution for any appropriate purpose of the institution.

Total assets of the institution increased by \$805,674.31, while total liabilities for the year decreased by (\$135,888.80). CVCC's total net assets for the year increased \$941,563.11.

A summary of the campus activity that resulted in the significant net asset changes are detailed below:

- 1) Total current assets decreased (\$7,824,382.54). Of this amount, (\$7,487,983.94) is a decrease in deposit with trustee as a result of spending the 2009 bond proceeds used to finance the current construction of the new instructional building on campus.
- 2) Capital assets increased \$8,641,164.19 and non-current assets decreased (\$11,107.34), investment in capital assets increased \$1,320,185.20 and restricted and unrestricted net assets decreased (\$378,622.09). These changes were the results from funding the following significant campus capital additions for fiscal year 2009-10:

- a) On May 11, 2009, the CVCC broke ground on the construction of a new \$12 million instructional classroom building. This critical building need adds additional classroom space for the College to grow and add new career/technical programs and enhance existing academic and career/technical disciplines and programs. The College's ten-year master plan shows that CVCC has the opportunity to respond to the local and regional needs of employers as well as to better prepare its students for higher levels of educational attainment. The College's goals require new state-of-the-art instructional classrooms and modern offices for the faculty. The College has not had new classrooms constructed in twenty-eight years, and existing instructional space has been maximized. The new building is projected to be completed by the 2011 spring semester. For the fiscal year 2009-10, construction in progress expenditures for the new academic building totaled \$7,973,383.52; to date building expenditures totaled \$10,011,316.10.
- b) On July 9, 2009, CVCC received emergency approval to proceed with the roof replacement of the Learning Resource Center. The roof decking was sliding and created an unsafe environment for students, faculty, and staff. As of 9/30/10, construction in progress expenditures for the roofing project totaled \$405,835.68; to date total project expenditures totaled \$457,033.00.
- c) Capital asset purchases included a new campus voice-over-internet protocol phone system for \$87,403.43. CVCC had been using an outdated analog phone system in which new lines for users had to be expanded with the growth of facilities on campus. The new system allows the College to meet its growing telecommunication needs.
- d) CVCC purchased \$170,000.00 in instructional software and equipment to support the new modeling and simulation technical program on campus.
- e) On June 24, 2010, CVCC received Board approval to renovate the Maintenance Building for classroom space. The building will house two new programs – Automotive Training Technology and Industrial Maintenance. Projected completion date is summer 2011. As of 9/30/10, construction in progress building expenditures totaled \$104,519.88.

B) Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets

Changes in total net assets as presented on the Statement of Net Assets are based on the activity presented in the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets. The purpose of the statement is to present the revenues received by the institution, both operating and non-operating, and the expenses paid by the institution, operating and non-operating, and any other revenues, expenses, gains and losses received or spent by the institution.

Generally speaking operating revenues are received for providing goods and services to the various customers and constituencies of the institution. Operating expenses are those expenses paid to acquire or produce the goods and services provided in return for the operating revenues, and to carry out the mission of the institution. Non-operating revenues are revenues received for which goods and services are not provided. For example, state appropriations are non-operating because they are provided by the Legislature to the institution without the Legislature directly receiving commensurate goods and services for those revenues.



The Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets reflect a positive year with an increase in net assets of \$941,563.11 at the end of the year. Some highlights of the information presented on the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets are the following:

The above chart displays, in thousands of dollars, the operating revenues by type and relationship with one another. Student tuition and fees represent 56% of operating revenue; followed by federal grants with 29%. All other types of revenue types represent only 15% of the total operating revenue.

CVCC's tuition rate for fiscal year 2009-10 was \$98 per credit hour for the Fall 2009 semester and \$112 for the Spring through Summer 2010 semesters. Effective Fall 2009, the campus implemented an \$8 per credit hour building fee which is restricted to help pay CVCC's annual debt payment associated with the newly constructed academic building. In the first year, the building fee collections totaled \$308,875.86. CVCC's tuition and fee rates are in line with the Department of Postsecondary Education tuition and fee State Board Policy guidelines; the amount per credit hour is the maximum that can be charged. Total student tuition and fees decreased for the year (\$555,534.84) due to a decrease in credit hour enrollment. A tuition summary (net of scholarship allowances) is shown below:

a) Academic year 2009-10 total credit hour enrollment was 44,223; a decrease of 4.5 percent from 2008-09.

The operating \$985,134.75 federal grants received comprised of: (1) \$180,617.57 in Title IV grant programs such as SEOG, College Work-Study, Academic Competiveness Grant and PELL administrative amounts to aid in student tuition costs, (2) \$85,538.07 to strengthen the College's occupational and vocational instructional programs, (3) \$237,183.71 in a BRAC workforce development training grant, (4) \$80,916.40 in adult education program grant, (5) \$337,123 in an American Recovery and Reinvestment Act grant; (6) \$56,075.57 from two Workforce Development grants Customer Service and Greening the Chattahoochee Valley and (7) \$7,680.43 from a FEMA grant.

CVCC received operating state and local contracts totaling \$461,767.34 which consisted of: (1) \$81,373.94 from Troy University, Phenix City campus for a bookstore profit sharing contract; (2) \$115,329.11 for Adult Education and English Second Language grants; (3) \$82,133.65 for student scholarship and grants from Alabama Student Assistance Program and Career Tech Dual Enrollment; (4) \$2,500 from Community Service grant; and (5) \$180,430.64 from various Workforce Development/Ready to Work grants to support technical instructional programs such as 20,000 Jobs, Automotive/Industrial Technology, English Second Language, and Ready to Work.

Other operating revenue of \$72,759.66 consists of campus parking tickets, vending, copy card sales, and GED fee revenue.


Non-operating revenue totaled \$10,519,695.64 which consisted of \$5,205,401 from state appropriations, \$5,130,985.54 from Title IV grants, \$113,812.90 from private gifts, \$61,696.20 from net investing activities, and \$7,800.00 for office space rent. CVCC also received capital grants of \$724,271.99 from Public School and Authority and a capital gift of \$100,000 from Troy University, Phenix City for a campus water line replacement project.

Total operating expenditures increased \$471,297.53 in fiscal year 2009-10. Several changes in expenses from prior years are worth noting. Salaries and wages college-wide increased \$52,920.52 due to annual rank and step increases for full-time employees and an increase in part-time hourly employees. Employee benefit costs increased \$35,594.73. Payments to vendors and supplies decreased (\$56,190.83), while depreciation expense increased \$17,076.31. Student aid increased \$421,896.80 due to Title IV grant and tuition rate increases.

Forty-four percent of the College’s \$13,506 million operating expenses is expended for salaries and wages. When benefits are combined with salaries and wages, the total is 58 percent of the College’s total operating expense. The second highest amount expended is Student Aid of \$3.1 million at 23 percent. The third highest operating expense of 16 percent is what the College pays to its vendors to acquire supplies, goods and services. Depreciation comprises 3 percent of the operating expenses.

The non-operating expenses include the first annual debt payment on the 2009 revenue bonds sold to finance the construction of a three-story instructional center. CVCC had a 2009-10 debt service payment of \$564,094.24 of which \$240,000 was for principal and \$324,094.24 for interest. Non-operating expenses also included the bond surety fee expense of \$13,342.00, trustee fee of \$2,500.00 and bond issuance cost amortization expense of \$11,107.35.

C) Statement of Cash Flows

The final statement presented is the Statement of Cash Flows which presents detailed information about the cash activity of the institution during the year. The statement is divided into five parts. The first part deals with operating cash flows and shows the net cash used by the operating activities of the institution. The second section reflects cash flows from non-capital financing activities. This section reflects the cash received and spent for non-operating, non-investing, and non-capital financing purposes. The third section deals with cash flows from capital and related financing activities. This section deals with the cash used for the acquisition and construction of capital and related items. The fourth section reflects the cash flows from investing activities and shows the purchases, proceeds, and interest received from investing activities. The fifth section reconciles the net cash used to the operating income or loss reflected on the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Assets.

Statement of Cash Flows

The primary cash receipts from operating activities consist of tuition and fees, grants, deposits refundable, and contracts. Cash outlays include payment of wages, benefits, supplies, utilities and scholarships.

State appropriations and federal Title IV pell grant payments are the primary sources of noncapital financing. This source of revenue is categorized as noncapital even though the College's budget depends on this to continue the current level of operations.

Capital and related financing activities include the purchases and construction of capital assets during the year, proceeds from the sale of bonds, and the College's annual bond payment consisting of principal and interest paid, along with deposits with trustees at year end.

Investing activities reflect purchases, sales, and interest income earned on investments. Investments identified in the cash flow statement as investing activities include both short-term and long-term investments.

Economic Outlook

Chattahoochee Valley Community College's overall financial position is sound and is hopeful and anticipating college growth in the near future. The State of Alabama is anticipating economic growth in the Russell/Lee and surrounding counties due to the recent KIA plant opening and the expected population increase due to the BRAC realignment at Ft. Benning, Georgia, in 2010. CVCC implemented new workforce development instructional programs in 2009-10 such as medical assisting, industrial and automotive maintenance technology, a simulation and modeling technician program, and a customer service academy to grow enrollment at the college. Also, the new academic and automotive training technology and industrial maintenance buildings opening in academic year 2011 and will support growth in the college's technical programs.

Dr. Laurel Blackwell, President, retired September 30, 2010, from the College. Dr. Philip Cleveland was named Acting President by Chancellor, Dr. Freida Hill on October 1, 2010 and will lead CVCC until a permanent search for a new president is conducted and concluded by Spring 2011. With new leadership, the college anticipates new direction and leadership to grow; meeting the academic and workforce development needs of our community.

However, the College does anticipate the future to present fiscal challenges. CVCC's current 2010-11 enrollment is showing declines of five percent. Also, with the recession continuing, the Alabama State Finance Department reports tax collections for the Alabama Trust Fund (the fund that provides appropriations for the College) will continue to be down for 2010-11. Proration of 11.23% was declared by the Governor of Alabama in fiscal year 2009-10. CVCC currently faces reduced operation and maintenance revenue of \$1,566,834 from fiscal year 2008-09 funding. With tax collections continuing to be down at the end of fiscal year 2009-10, an additional 2 to 7 percent proration is projected to be declared for the 2010-11 fiscal year. Due to these state fiscal challenges, the State Board of Education on October 22, 2009 voted to raise tuition \$5 per credit hour for fiscal year 2010-11 to help offset the loss of O&M revenue. However, the College expects level tuition and fee revenue in 2010-11 even with the decreases in enrollment of five percent.

The College does have \$4.1 million of unrestricted liquid assets that is being applied toward the appropriation shortfalls created by the Governor's declaration of proration for the past three years. These known facts and conditions are expected to impact the financial position of the College during the 2010-11 fiscal year. However, the financial stability of the College will not be impaired and CVCC will be able to carry out the College's mission of providing training for academic transfer, adult education and workforce development. We believe the College is positioned to withstand these fiscal challenges we face because of our conservative fiscal approach.

Note 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements of Chattahoochee Valley Community College (the “College”) are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP). The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant accounting policies of the College are described below.

A. Reporting Entity

For financial reporting purposes, Chattahoochee Valley Community College is part of the primary government of the State of Alabama. The State of Alabama, through the State Board of Education, governs the Department of Postsecondary Education. The Department of Postsecondary Education, through its Chancellor, has the authority and responsibility for the operation, management, supervision and regulation of Chattahoochee Valley Community College.

B. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The financial statements of Chattahoochee Valley Community College have been prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Chattahoochee Valley Community College follows all applicable GASB pronouncements as well as the following pronouncements issued on or before November 30, 1989 unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements: Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Statements and Interpretations, Accounting Principles Board (APB) Opinions, and Accounting Research Bulletins (ARBs).

It is the policy of the College to first apply restricted resources when an expense is incurred and then apply unrestricted resources when both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available.

The Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets distinguishes between operating and nonoperating revenues. Operating revenues, such as tuition and fees, result from exchange transactions associated with the principal activities of the College. Exchange transactions are those in which each party to the transactions receives or gives up essentially equal values. Nonoperating revenues arise from exchange transactions not associated with the College’s principal activities, such as investment income and from all nonexchange transactions, such as state appropriations.

C. Assets, Liabilities, and Net Assets

1. Deposits and Investments

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

Statutes authorize the College to invest in the same type of instruments as allowed by Alabama law for domestic life insurance companies. This includes a wide range of investments, such as direct obligations of the United States of America, obligations issued or guaranteed by certain federal agencies, and bonds of any state, county, city, town, village, municipality, district or other political subdivision of any state or any instrumentality or board thereof or of the United States of America that meet specified criteria.

2. Receivables

Accounts receivable relate to amounts due from federal grants, third party tuition, and receivables from financial institutions.

3. Capital Assets

Capital assets, other than intangibles, with a unit cost of over \$5,000 and an estimated useful life in excess of one year, and all library books, are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. The capitalization threshold for intangible assets such as capitalized software and internally generated computer software is \$1 million and \$100,000 for easements and land use rights and patents, trademarks and copyrights. In addition, works of art and historical treasures and similar assets are recorded at their historical cost. Donated capital assets are recorded at fair market value at the date of donation. Land, Construction in Progress and intangible assets with indefinite lives are the only capital assets that are not depreciated. Depreciation is not allocated to a functional expense category. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend its life are not capitalized.

Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed. The amount of interest to be capitalized is calculated by offsetting interest expense incurred from the date of the borrowing until completion of the project with interest earned on invested proceeds over the same period.

Maintenance and repairs are charged to operations when incurred. Betterments and major improvements which significantly increase values, change capacities or extend useful lives are capitalized. Upon the sale or retirement of fixed assets being depreciated using the straight-line method, the cost and related accumulated depreciation are removed from the respective accounts and any resulting gain or loss is included in the results of operation.

4. Long-Term Obligations

Long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the Statement of Net Assets. Bond premiums and discounts, as well as issuance costs, are deferred and amortized over the life of the bonds.

5. Compensated Absences

No liability is recorded for sick leave. Substantially all employees of the College earn 12 days of sick leave each year with unlimited accumulation. Payment is not made to employees for unpaid sick leave at termination or retirement.

All non-instructional employees earn annual leave at a rate which varies from 12 to 24 days per year depending on duration of employment, with accumulation limited to 60 days. Instructional employees do not earn annual leave. Payment is made to employees for unused leave at termination or retirement.

6. Deferred Tuition and Fee Revenue

Tuition and fee revenues received but related to the period after September 30, 2010, have been deferred.

7. Net Assets

Net assets are required to be classified for accounting and reporting purposes into the following net asset categories:

- ◆ **Invested in Capital Assets, Net of Related Debt** – Capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and outstanding principal balances of debt attributable to the acquisition, construction or improvement of those assets. Any significant unspent related debt proceeds at year-end related to capital assets are not included in this calculation.

- ◆ **Restricted:**
 - ✓ **Nonexpendable** – Net assets subject to externally imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the College. Such assets include the College’s permanent endowment funds.

 - ✓ **Expendable** – Net assets whose use by the College is subject to externally imposed stipulations that can be fulfilled by actions of the College pursuant to those stipulations or that expire by the passage of time.

- ◆ **Unrestricted** – Net assets that are not subject to externally imposed stipulations. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of management or the State Board of Education.

8. Federal Financial Assistance Programs

The College participates in various federal programs. Federal programs are audited in accordance with the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996, the U. S. Office of Management and Budget Revised Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments and Non-Profit Organizations*, and the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Compliance Supplement.

9. Scholarship Allowances and Student Aid

Student tuition and fees are reported net of scholarship allowances and discounts. The amount for scholarship allowances and discounts is the difference between the stated charge for goods and services provided by the College and the amount that is paid by the student and/or third parties making payments on behalf of the student. The College uses the case-by-case method to determine the amount of scholarship allowances and discounts.

Note 2 – Deposits and Investments

A. Deposits

The College's deposits at year-end were held by financial institutions in the State of Alabama's Security for Alabama Funds Enhancement (SAFE) Program. The SAFE Program was established by the Alabama Legislature and is governed by the provisions contained in the *Code of Alabama 1975*, Sections 41-14A-1 through 41-14A-14. Under the SAFE Program all public funds are protected through a collateral pool administered by the Alabama State Treasurer's Office. Under this program, financial institutions holding deposits of public funds must pledge securities as collateral against those deposits. In the event of failure of a financial institution, securities pledged by that financial institution would be liquidated by the State Treasurer to replace the public deposits not covered by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation (FDIC). If the securities pledged fail to produce adequate funds, every institution participating in the pool would share the liability for the remaining balance.

The Statement of Net Assets classification "cash and cash equivalents" includes all readily available cash such as petty cash, demand deposits, and certificates of deposits with maturities of three months or less.

B. Investments

The College may invest its funds in securities and investments authorized by the *Code of Alabama 1975*, Section 16-13-2, Sections 27-1-8 and 27-1-9, and Sections 27-41-1 through 27-41-41. These laws provide that the College may invest in the same type of instruments as allowed by Alabama law for domestic life insurance companies. This includes a wide range of investments, such as direct obligations of the United States of America, obligations issued or guaranteed by certain federal agencies, and bonds of any state, county, city, town, village, municipality, district or other political subdivision of any state or any instrumentality or board thereof of the United States of America that meet specified criteria. The College's investment policy permits investments in the following: 1) U. S. Treasury bills, notes, bonds, and stripped Treasuries 2) U. S. Agency notes, bonds, debentures, discount notes and certificates, 3) certificates of deposit (CDs), checking and money market accounts of savings and loan associations, mutual savings banks, or commercial banks whose accounts are insured by FDIC/FSLIC, and who are designated a Qualified Public Depository (QPD) under the SAFE Program; 4) mortgage backed securities (MBSs), 5) mortgage-related securities including collateralized mortgage obligations (CMOs) and real estate mortgage investment conduits (REMIC) securities, 6) repurchase agreements, and 7) stocks and bonds which have been donated to the institution.

Short-term investments as shown on the Statement of Net Assets consist primarily of non-negotiable certificates of deposit in the amount of \$3,814,513.74 which are not subject to risk categorization as they are considered deposits for the purpose of this note.

The Statement of Net Assets Deposit with Bond Trustee classification consists of accounts administered by a bond trustee. As of September 30, 2010, the College had \$894,545.73 in accounts administered by its bond trustee. In accordance with the College's revenue bonds, the trustee is permitted to invest these funds in direct general obligations of the United States or securities, the payment of which is unconditionally guaranteed by the United States.

Interest Rate Risk – is the risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. As a means of limiting its exposure to fair value losses arising from rising interest rates, the College's investment policy limits its investment maturities as follows:

Note 5 – Defined Benefit Pension Plan

A. Plan Description

The College contributes to the Teachers' Retirement System of Alabama, a cost-sharing multiple-employer public employee retirement system for the various state-supported educational agencies and institutions. This plan is administered by the Retirement Systems of Alabama.

Substantially all employees of the College are members of the Teachers' Retirement System. Membership is mandatory for covered or eligible employees of Chattahoochee Valley Community College. Benefits vest after 10 years of creditable service. Vested employees may retire with full benefits at age 60 or after 25 years of service. Retirement benefits are calculated by two methods with the retiree receiving payment under the method which yields the highest monthly benefit. The methods are (1) Minimum Guaranteed, or (2) Formula, of which the Formula method usually produces the highest monthly benefit. Under this method retirees are allowed 2.0125% of their average final salary (best three of the last ten years) for each year of service. Disability retirement benefits are calculated in the same manner. Pre-retirement death benefits in the amount of the annual salary for the fiscal year preceding death are provided to plan members.

The Teachers' Retirement System was established as of October 1, 1941, under the provisions of Act Number 419, Acts of Alabama 1939, for the purpose of providing retirement allowances and other specified benefits for qualified persons employed by state-supported educational institutions. The responsibility for general administration and operation of the Teachers' Retirement System is vested in the Board of Control (currently 14 members). Benefit provisions are established by the *Code of Alabama 1975*, Sections 16-25-1 through 16-25-113, as amended, and Sections 36-27B-1 through 36-27B-6, as amended.

The Retirement Systems of Alabama issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the Teachers' Retirement System of Alabama. That report may be obtained by writing to The Retirement Systems of Alabama, 135 South Union Street, Montgomery, Alabama 36130-2150.

B. Funding Policy

Employees, with the exception of full-time law enforcement officers, are required by statute to contribute 5 percent of their salary to the Teachers' Retirement System. As of January 1, 2001, full-time law enforcement officers (as defined by Act Number 2000-669, Acts of Alabama, page 1335) are required by statute to contribute 6 percent of their salary to the Teachers' Retirement System. Chattahoochee Valley Community College is required to contribute the remaining amounts necessary to fund the actuarially determined contributions to ensure sufficient assets will be available to pay benefits when due. Each year the Teachers' Retirement System recommends to the Legislature the contribution rate for the following fiscal year, with the Legislature setting this rate in the annual appropriation bill.

The percentages of the contributions and the amount of contributions made by Chattahoochee Valley Community College and its employees equal the required contributions for each year as follows:

Note 6 – Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB)

A. Plan Description

The College contributes to the Alabama Retired Education Employees' Health Care Trust (the "Trust"), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit postemployment healthcare plan. The Trust provides health care benefits to state and local school system retirees and was established in 2007 under the provisions of Act Number 2007-16, Acts of Alabama, as an irrevocable trust fund. Responsibility for general administration and operations of the Trust is vested with the Public Education Employees' Health Insurance Board (PEEHIB) members. The *Code of Alabama 1975*, Section 16-25A-4, provides the PEEHIB with the authority to amend the benefit provisions in order to provide reasonable assurance of stability in future years. The Trust issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained at the Public Education Employees' Health Insurance Plan website, <http://www.rsa-al.gov/PEEHIP/peehip.html> under the Trust Fund Financials tab. The provisions of GASB Statement Number 45, *Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits Other than Pensions*, were implemented prospectively.

B. Funding Policy

The Public Education Employees' Health Insurance Fund (PEEHIF) was established in 1983 under the provisions of Act Number 255, Acts of Alabama, to provide a uniform plan of health insurance for current and retired employees of state educational institutions. The plan is administered by the PEEHIB. Any Trust fund assets used in paying administrative costs and retiree benefits are transferred to and paid from the PEEHIF. The PEEHIB periodically reviews the funds available in the PEEHIF and if excess funds are determined to be available, the PEEHIB authorizes a transfer of funds from the PEEHIF to the Trust. Retirees are required to contribute monthly as follows:

For employees that retire other than for disability, for each year under 25 years of service, the retiree pays two percent of the employer premium and for each year over 25 years of service, the retiree premium is reduced by two percent of the employer premium. The tobacco surcharge is \$25.00 per month for retired members who smoke.

The College is required to contribute at a rate specified by the State for each active employee. The College's share of premiums for retired employees health insurance is included as part of the premium for active employees. The following shows the required contributions in dollars and the percentage of that amount contributed for retirees:

Each year the PEEHIB certifies to the Governor and to the Legislature the contribution rates based on the amount needed to fund coverage for benefits for the following fiscal year and the Legislature sets the premium rate in the annual appropriation bill. This results in a pay-as-you-go funding method.

Note 7 – Construction and Other Significant Commitments

The College began construction of a new instructional center in fiscal year 2009 and renovations to the maintenance building in fiscal year 2010. The total amounts remaining to complete these projects are approximately \$2,200,000.00.

As of September 30, 2010, Chattahoochee Valley Community College had been awarded approximately \$1,153,889.94 in contracts and grants on which performance had not been accomplished and funds had not been received. These awards, which represent commitments of sponsors to provide funds for specific purposes, have not been reflected in the financial statements.

Pledged Revenues

The College has pledged student tuition and fee revenue to repay the \$9,000,000 Revenue Bond Series 2009 issued in July 2009. Future revenues in the approximate amount of \$14,721,375.00 are pledged to repay the principal and interest on the bonds. During the 2010 fiscal year, pledged tuition and fee revenue in the amount of \$5,691,539.69, excluding technology fees, were received. \$594,142.71 or 10.4% of pledged revenues was used to pay principal and interest. These bonds are scheduled to mature in fiscal year 2034.

Note 10 – Risk Management

The College is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. The College has insurance for its buildings and contents through the State Insurance Fund (SIF), part of the State of Alabama, Department of Finance; Division of Risk Management which operates as a common risk management and insurance program for state owned properties. The College pays an annual premium based on the amount of coverage requested. The SIF provides coverage up to \$2 million per occurrence and is self-insured up to a maximum of \$6 million in aggregate claims. The SIF purchases commercial insurance for claims which in the aggregate exceed \$6 million. The College purchases commercial insurance for its automobile coverage, general liability, and professional legal liability coverage. In addition, the College has fidelity bonds on the College's President, Business Manager and Student Financial Aid Director as well as on all other college personnel who handle funds.

Employee health insurance is provided through the Public Education Employees' Health Insurance Fund (PEEHIF) administered by the Public Education Employees' Health Insurance Board (PEEHIB). The Fund was established to provide a uniform plan of health insurance for current and retired employees of state educational institutions and is self-sustaining. Monthly premiums for employee and dependent coverage are determined annually by the plan's actuary and based on anticipated claims in the upcoming year, considering any remaining fund balance on hand available for claims. The College contributes a specified amount monthly to the PEEHIF for each employee and this amount is applied against the employee's premiums for the coverage selected and the employee pays any remaining premium.

Settled claims resulting from these risks have not exceeded the College's coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

Claims which occur as a result of employee job-related injuries may be brought before the State of Alabama Board of Adjustment. The Board of Adjustment serves as an arbitrator and its decision is binding. If the Board of Adjustment determines that a claim is valid, it decides the proper amount of compensation (subject to statutory limitations) and the funds are paid by the College.

Note 11 – Endowments

The College has endowments established by donors for the purpose of awarding scholarships to needy and worthy students. These scholarships were endowed by contributions totaling \$30,000.00, which is to be continuously invested in certificates of deposit at local financial institutions with the understanding that only the interest earned may be used for scholarship purposes.

Note 12 – Related Parties

Chattahoochee Valley Community College Foundation, Inc.

Chattahoochee Valley Community College Foundation, Inc., was incorporated as a non-profit corporation to promote scientific, literary, and educational purposes, the advancement of Chattahoochee Valley Community College, and for the encouragement and support of its student and faculty. 
